We have established deep roots in Central Minnesota and have developed a well-known and respected program. Having an endowment gives BBBS the opportunity to expand our reach to unserved and underserved communities.

We are securing commitments to build a \$10 million endowment to insure our current operations and to enable us to **adapt and grow**. Building a \$10 million endowment fund will bring in critical dollars to fund our mission in the future. A \$400,000 draw off the interest earned will enable us to be there for Bigs and Littles in the years to come.
